<u>THIS MEETING—JULY 17th—OPEN WORKSHOP—BYOB—MATERIAL SUP-</u>PLIED

We will be using our new format of the open workshop. This was a format we experimented with last year that we had great success with. Instead of one person chairing the workshop offering a critique of each of our trees, we were able to bring in a tree that we wanted to work on and have several people offer suggestions. Then we were able to chose the one that suited us the best and begin work on the "material" to convert it into the beginnings of a bonsai.

This seemed to work really well. It emphasized the thought that there are many different possible bonsai in a single piece of material that we are working with and each one could be a lovely bonsai that we would like very much. But by having them pointed out by many different "experts", we could chose the one that suited us the best and fulfilled our idea of what it should look like. Sometimes it just stimulated our imagination and we could see a tree that none of the "experts" saw that we liked even more. It looks like a good format for future meetings.

Everyone is encouraged to participate by bringing in a tree to work on and to be prepared to offer help and advice to others in the group who may need that extra bit of advice and your years of experience. We have a number of new members who would appreciate any help that would be offered.

Who is John Romano


BIO" I have studied bonsai for close to 30 years. I have been working at New England Bonsai Gardens for the past 10 years teaching and styling trees. Run the Kaikou School of Bonsai at New England Bonsai Gardens.

I've studied for a short time at Taisho en in Shizuuoka Japan with Mr. Urushibata, worked with artists in residence at NEBG: Kenji Miyata, Hiromi Tsukada, Mitsuo Matsuda. "

"My first experience with plants was at 4 years old- helping my Italian Grandfather plant seeds and later pruning apple, pear and fig trees in the garden.

This was my first 'crossing path' with trees. In 1975 I started to 'play' with bonsai. It was more like creating a morgue for trees! After this first foray in futility, I stumbled upon some good books and finally found New England Bonsai Gardens (then in South Natick) and my passion was rooted. I've had many teachers over the years - in single courses and workshops - as well as more extensive learning relationships with Kenji Miyata at New England Bonsai Gardens and a short study period at Taisho en in Shizuoka, Japan with shohin bonsai

master, Nobuichi Urushibata. I have been teaching bonsai students at New England Bonsai Gardens since 2000. "
