LAST MONTH'S MEETING —AUG 21 st —GUEST ARTIST — JOHN ROMANO — AM L/D & PM WORKSHOP

Our Guest artist was John Romano from Rhode Island and also teaches at New England Bonsai. His area of expertise was Shohin (small bonsai). He studied for two years in Japan at a Shohin nursery. The demo plant was a Scots Pine **donated** from Virginia Shen's collection. John proceeded to explain and outline the techniques for treating various pines in order to produce shorter needles. By balancing the trees energy. John went into much detail explaining the different areas of the Pine from weak to middle and to strong sections and how they must be handled.

BLACK pines have 2 needles. WHITE pines have 5 needles and must be treated differently. PITCH pines 2 or 3 needles. Black pines: April to May, the candles elongate and the needles start separating at this time. You can pull or cut the candle leaving a short (1/4") stub. June 15 - July 4 new buds appear (the second growth) and they must be pruned according to there area of strength. The buds grow into candles and you can cut the full candles that opened at the base, leaving about 1/4". At the top of plant (the strongest area), cut full candle. At middle, leave a small stub. Inside, (the weakest area) leave no stubs. Over time, the vigorous black pine's energy is renewed and rebalanced.

White pines are treated differently: Early spring – pinch buds. Summer – pinch candles. Early fall – thin needles by plucking and not cutting. Initially remove 5-8 pairs. Then remove 7-12 pairs. Bud removal for all pines is important in order to avoid larger knuckles or bulbous growth. It also is energy balancing and retards stronger growth where it is not needed.

Scots pines have good short needles. Feed them strongly in June and July so that later candle cutting can be successful. Winter is the best time for big cuts, before sap flows and the plant bleeds Sap excessively. Needle cutting is permissible.

There was so much information given by John that it is impossible to relay it all here. This is a good subject for all of our members to investigate.

The demo plant was a Scots pine and won by Rose. She was advised to feed it heavily until mid October with liquid fertilizer, lots of sunshine and brushing to encourage budding. The workshop followed.

This time we will be doing something different . It will be a two-day event. On Saturday, Sept 17th, we will have **a pot luck dinner and demo** at the **Closter Nature Center set up time 5:30 pm, starting at 6 pm**.. Everyone is asked to bring in their favorite dish. It can be drink, salad, pasta, main course, dessert..... Please let our chair person **Diane Pinkowski** know what you will bring for the dinner so we will not have too much of the same kind.

During the dinner, Eric will be presenting a demo. He will pick one of the trees (bonsai) that members bring in to work on. The member whose tree Eric picks will have to pay a fee of \$50.00 to our club. This is a one-time opportunity to have a professional give your tree the finishing touch.

On the next day Sept 18th, we will hold our regular meeting. In the morning, Eric will be giving **CON-STRUCTIVE CRITIQUES** and everyone will have a chance to have him **critique your tree (but not work on)**. He will spend about 10 minutes on each tree. It will be for a small fee of \$10.00. If you want to excel in your bonsai technique, this is the time to learn from an expert. Bring in your tree (bonsai) and let the expert give you his view points. In the afternoon, there will be a workshop with Eric. **Space is still available, participation fee is \$40.00.
