

LAST MONTH MEETING —JUL 21ST. — JIM DOYLE LECTURE DEMO/ MATERIAL SUPPLIED WORKSHOP AND SALE



It was so exciting to have Jim Doyle with us that Peter totally skipped the business meeting in order to introduce Jim as soon as possible. I will not dwell on Jim's background, reputation, or skills regarding bonsai since we are all aware of them. We felt so lucky to have him visit us.

Jim is a master collector of yamadori and has sold innumerable numbers of trees that he has personally collected from various parts of the world. The proof (if needed) was in the slide exhibit that he presented to us showing his presence at high peaks, snow covered mountains,, and rugged rock covered valleys looking for and finding just the right tree that had bonsai potential and could be dug out of the rocks

reasonably root intact. These trees were begging Jim to take them home since they somehow knew that once Jim got his hands on them, they would become extraordinary trees in beauty, shape, and health. They even had the potential to live for ever if cared for properly. What an honor!!!

When that was over, Jim found in front of him a very strange looking spruce with a pair of trunks that had a "U" at the base but with a lot of motion in the trunk, sitting along side of a third trunk that rose from the base straight up with almost no taper. Jim showed us seven possibilities (and there were probably many more) to chose from in order to convert this lucky unattractive spruce into an outstanding bonsai. The one he chose resulted in the third trunk being removed (ouch!) and the other two redesigned into a slanting pair in a bunjing style bringing out the best in each other. With a lot or wiring by Peter and Mike, Jim twisted and turned branches until a lovely pre-bonsai tree evolved. Now it is up to the owner and the tree to grow and get shaped into the fine tree that it has the potential to be.

The afternoon was spent in a workshop with Jim helping the workshop group arrive at a style for their trees and answering their questions in order to come away with more knowledge than they had before and a better and healthier tree. - Mitch

<u>PART II— SEPT 29TH — GUEST ARTIST FROM JAPAN — M. YAMAJI —PRESENT</u> <u>LECTURE / DEMO</u>



Hiroyoshi Yamaji, the second owner of the Yamaji Sanshoen garden, helped his father while he was in his childhood and brushed up his bonsai-cultivating techniques. "It was a natural course for me to follow in my father's footsteps since Japan's bonsai boom was going on at that time," recalls Yamaji. In those days, there were sufficient bonsai materials -- an abundant amount of trees picked up from the wild. Many tourists and guests from major urban areas in Japan came to Kagawa Prefecture. A number of bonsai plants in containers were on display at souvenir shops along the approach to the famous Kotohira-gu Shrine, also known as Kompira Shrine, in the town of Kotohira near Takamatsu. Bonsai culture was flourishing.

We are very fortunate to have Mr. Yamaji to come to our club. As all ways, in the morning there will be lecture / demo on how to create bonsai. The afternoon will be an added study group for a charge. It is limited to 8 members only. If you are interested and have not yet register, please contact Peter Sobel. Silent observers are welcomes.

BONSAI CARE FROM YAMA KI BONSAI SOCIETY — MONTH —AUGUST

For Hardy, Tropical and Sub– Tropical

1.) Fertilizing — Stop feeding hardy plants by end of August, except evergreen needle.

2.) Location— Remove to half shade soft needles evergreen (e.g., Larch), thin leafed broad leaf, and deciduous (e.g., Maple Hornbeam).

- 3.) Pests & Diseases Protect from sun after spray, Watch for red spider.
- 4.) Potting Evergreen 1st week only; Hardy No; Tropical Yes
- 5.) Pruning Hardy no drastic pruning; Tropical Yes
- 6.) Watering Before sunrise and after sunset use mist spray in addition to regular watering.
